Jacquelynne Eccles is the Wilbert McKeachie Collegiate Professor of Psychology, Women's Studies and Education at the University of Michigan, USA. Furthermore, she is research scientist at the Institute for Social Research, Interim Chair of Psychology at the University of Michigan and Director of the Gender and Achievement Research Program. Over the last 30 years, she has conducted research on a wide variety of topics including gender-role socialization, teacher expectancies, classroom influences on student motivation and social development in the family and school context. Jacquelynne Eccles has served as the past chair of the Advisory Committee for the Social, Behavioural and Economic Directorate at the National Science Foundation and as the chair of the MacArthur Foundation Research Network on Successful Pathways through Middle Childhood. She has also been associate editor of the journal 'Child Development'. In 1999, her work was honoured by the Society for the Psychological Study of Social Issues with the Kurt Lewin Memorial Award for 'outstanding contributions to the development and integration of psychological research and social action'.
